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What is knife crime awareness week?

Twice a year during May and November, Op Sceptre (knife crime awareness week) takes place. This is an intensification week where activity is implemented across Hampshire and IOW to target knife crime, take knives off the street and educate children, families and communities. Reducing knife crime is a focus Hampshire and Isle of Wight constabulary all year round, but we know that when we broaden that focus during Op Sceptre weeks, we reach more people and include them to get knives off our street.

The Violence Reduction Unit have produced this pack to help you get involved and share information with the children, young people and communities you work with.

The focus of this pack is reporting knife crime, getting support, and awareness raising. Much of the information in the pack can be used at any time of the year so although we would encourage you to use it during knife crime awareness week please feel free to use it at any time.

What is the Violence Reduction Unit?

Hampshire and Isle of Wight VRU is a small team who work in partnership to coordinate a collaborative response to tackle the root causes of violence. The VRU supports the Violence Reduction Partnership (VRP) made up of 25 different public sector bodies across the Hampshire, Isle of Wight, Portsmouth & Southampton (HIPS) area who come together to make our communities safer.

What is the Violence Reduction Partnership?

The VRP is a partnership of authorities across Hampshire, IOW, Portsmouth and Southampton, who work together to tackle and prevent serious violence. They are police, health, justice fire, local authorities, education, prisons and the voluntary and charity sector.

The Serious Violence Duty was introduced under the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Act 2022 and requires specified and relevant authorities to work together to prevent and reduce serious violence. The Serious Violence Duty requires partnerships to take a multiagency, public health approach to understand the causes and impact of serious violence develop a strategic response, which focuses on prevention and early intervention, and monitor the impact of this response. The Violence Reduction Partnership has a vision for Hampshire, the Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Southampton to be a place where people can live their lives free from violence and the fear of violence.

The Serious Violence and Knife Crime Participation Pack has been developed to strengthen the VRP's conversations with young people about their experiences of serious violence and knife crime. The pack contains 5 x 15 minute session plans which are designed to educate and empower young people from 11-25 on the topic and allow the VRP to gather feedback about their experiences. Webinars

We have also worked with the Ben Kinsella Trust to produce a webinar on '<u>Having Honest Conversations</u>'. Much like the crib sheet above it gives advice and information on how to plan and begin an honest conversation with young people about this tricky subject.

Letters to parents and carers

In November 2023 we wrote to all secondary schools with a letter for parents and carers around knife crime. This was very well received, and schools told us we should include primary schools so in May 2024 we did this. To reach more parents and carers we also worked with housing providers send a letter via their networks. We know if we talk about knife crime we raise awareness and encourage parents and carers to talk to their children.

#NeverChooseKnives Campaign

The #NeverChooseKnives campaign promotes safety and positive choices by focusing on reassurance, risk and consequence, resilience, and responsibility.

Carrying a knife doesn't protect you—it puts you at greater risk. We want to reassure everyone that the vast majority of young people do not carry knives, and choosing to stay knife-free is the safest path. The campaign also highlights the serious consequences of carrying a knife, including the potential for injury and up to 5 years in prison, even if it's not used.

To support the message, we've created posters and engaging social media assets to help communities take part. Share the message online, join the conversation with #NeverChooseKnives, and use the campaign materials to raise awareness.

We are also excited to say we have worked with Unloc this year and are using their 'I Wont Give Up' music video as part of the #NeverChooseKnives messages.

Unloc - 'I Won't Give Up' Music Video

'I Won't Give Up' is an urban rap track created by young people Benitez, Kizz, Bagins & Mystical Truth. This exciting project came together over the past few months as Unloc brought together young artists to aim for social justice as part of Unloc's Inspiring Change programme. Unloc is a non-for-profit organisation working throughout the UK with schools and colleges, focusing on a strong mission to empower young people to be innovative change makers who seek to build stronger communities and sustainable businesses.

Their Inspiring Change programme empowered young people to come together and talk about the social issues they cared about the most, then create and design their own social action programmes to tackle them. One such group were the young people who have written and perform on a rap track of their own creation, working in partnership with charity Music Fusion to create a message to other young people reflecting on their own lived experience of gang culture, knife crime and youth violence.

The group have created a stunning single in 'I Won't Give Up' that they are so incredibly proud of, pouring their hearts and souls into creating a single that speaks of their real experiences and cuts to the heart of the issue. With a music video to go with the track it's available on YouTube to share on your platforms and social media channels to promote this message in a way that resonates with young people in their own language.
